What the Community Foundation Can Do For You

Nearly a decade ago, I recall being asked by one of our citizens, "What can the community foundation do for me?" After a brief moment, I responded the best I could, but our discussion eventually became quite lengthy. After visiting with this individual, I thought that there must be many more of our donors and citizens who might be thinking the same thing. So, below is my condensed version of our hour-long conversation.

The Foundation provides permanence. You are assured that your gifts will benefit the agencies, residents, and students of your community in perpetuity ("forever"). Your gift will be safe. As a permanent endowment, the principal will never be spent - but the earnings will be there to permanently support your community.

The Foundation provides flexibility. You may select from a variety of types of funds, which we call "endowment funds." There are a variety of ways in which you may want to benefit your community with your gift. Check out all the options on our website at: www.wicf-inc.org.

Gifts to the Foundation can reduce your tax burden. Income taxes are reduced through deductions allowed by the IRS for contributions to a public charity, which is how a community foundation is classified.


Your community foundation provides professional administration. The community foundation continually assesses the changing needs of your community and awards grants to agencies best addressing those needs, sparing you, the donor, of having to make such judgments. In the case of designated funds, the community foundation easily handles the issuance of annual grants to the organizations you specify when you establish the fund.

Your community foundation provides a perfect alternative to a private foundation. Donors who want the individual involvement of a private foundation without the accompanying administrative complexities, restrictions, and expenses can accomplish the same result by establishing a donor-advised fund with the community foundation. Using a donoradvised fund within a community foundation also offers a donor more generous tax deductions than those offered to donors to a private foundation.

Whatever your charitable intentions, there are ways to achieve them through your gift to your community foundation. The community foundation is easy, convenient, and inexpensive.

New Funds

The endowment funds listed below have recently been established by local organizations, businesses, and/or caring citizens. Any individual, business, or organization can establish a fund and/or contribute to an existing fund at any time.

Donations made to these endowment funds are invested and a portion of the earnings is used to award grants to community organizations and/or to award scholarships to students for their post-high school education. Donations can be made in a variety of forms including gifts of cash, stock, real estate, life insurance, and charitable bequests.

Endowment funds can be established in honor or memory of loved ones for as little as \$1,000. Payouts ("distributions") from endowment funds begin when the fund has reached \$10,000 in cumulative donations and has been invested for one full calendar year.

Here is a listing of the most recent endowment funds established though the Western Indiana Community Foundation.

Nancy Bourne Benevolent Fund

The Attica Community Foundation is pleased to announce the establishment of the Nancy Bourne Benevolent Fund in memory of Nancy Rose Bourne.

Nancy was born on November 23, 1947, to Milton Sylvester Bourne and Wavalene Lois (Conner) Bourne Strait. After graduation in 1965 from Pennville High School, she earned her bachelor's and master's degrees in education from Ball State University. Her teaching career began at Lake Ridge Junior High School in Gary, Indiana, and later continued at Calumet High School in Gary and East Jay Elementary in Portland, Indiana. In 1977, Nancy began teaching at Seeger Memorial High School in West Lebanon, Indiana. For 36 years, until her retirement in 2013, she was admired and respected as a talented, dedicated, and quite witty English teacher. Among Nancy's community activities were Delta Theta Chapter of Kappa Kappa, Fountain-Warren Retired Teachers Association, and the Moose Lodge of Attica.



The purpose of the fund is to provide financial support for elderly citizens of the Attica Community. Such assistance would include, but not necessarily be limited to, food, clothing, prescriptions, and transportation for their medical care. A variety of organizations may be the beneficiary of grants from the fund. Some of these would include, but not necessarily be limited to, the Attica Thrift Shop, Attica Sharing Kindness (ASK), Mobility for Area Citizens (MAC Van - a program of the Community Action Agency of Western Indiana), and Township Board of Trustees (Davis, Logan, Shawnee).

The Pay It Forward Scholarship Fund

The Pay It Forward Scholarship Fund has been established for the benefit of worthy student(s) who graduate from Covington, Attica, or Fountain Central High School.

The donor family values integrity and hard work. They hope this scholarship not only helps the recipient in further education, but also prepares him or her for serving others.

The applicant(s) must be pursuing a field of study or career in the trades and technical education pathway. Trade schools come in a wide variety of forms - some may be a part of an associate degree program, and some are totally autonomous. A major thought behind the scholarship is that trade schools and technical education programs provide specialized education for trade-based careers that focus specifically on job-related skills and does not typically require an advanced degree (bachelor's and/or associate's degree).

Applicants for The Pay It Forward Scholarship must be pursuing a career trade such as aviation, machining, dental, electrical, welding, medical, plumbing, robotics, construction, and the like. This is not an exhaustive list; however, one of the key intentions of the scholarship is to provide an award to a student who is pursuing a career that is reflective of trade work.

The scholarship award is in the amount of \$10,000. Fifty percent (\$5,000) will be awarded for a student in their first year of trade or technical school. An additional \$5,000 will be provided for their second year.

Nonprofit Groups Share in Grants from Community Foundations

Grant monies are made available by donations from caring individuals who want to make a difference by improving the quality of life for others.



Western Indiana Community Foundation Awarded \$50,000 through a grant partnership with the Wabash Heartland Innovation Network. The Wabash Heartland Innovation Network is a consortium of 10 counties in north-central Indiana devoted to working together to fuel prosperity by harnessing the power of internet-enabled sensors to develop our region into a global epicenter of digital agriculture and next-generation manufacturing.



Veedersburg Revitalization Association - \$12,500. These monies will be used to assist in completing the \$100,000 remodeling project of the historic 1903 Clover Leaf Depot. The Depot will be a popular spot in the hub of Fountain County to host family gatherings, celebrations, and certain business meetings. The Depot is in the heart of the Town of Veedersburg and is adjacent to the favorable multi-purpose Big Four Trail (biking/walking).

Fountain County Landmarks - \$12,500. The one-room frame Old Attica Library/Ladies Library was designed and completed in 1889 for \$1,000. Nearly 1,000 volume titles from the original library are on display in the building. The historic building is in need of a new HVAC system, painting, and some exterior repairs. Last year's grant assisted in the replacement of the roof and removal of a chimney. The local city government uses the building for meetings and office space as needed. Attica Main Street also uses the space. Located on a triangular plot in Attica's national historic district the Old Library is used for school field trips and serves as the headquarters for many of Attica's local events, plus more.

Veedersburg Public Library - \$12,500. Last year's grant was used to build a 16' x 24' outdoor pavilion on the east side of the building. A sloped inclined sidewalk provides handicap accessibility. Additional funding will provide an exterior door installed on the side of the library building and a sidewalk connecting the building and the pavilion to allow for smoother traffic flow for patrons and staff during events. Also, gutters will be installed on the pavilion, a cement bike pad, a light above the door for security, and landscaping.

Covington Public Library - \$12,500. Last year's grant of \$10,000 supplemented by another large benefactor allowed the transformation of the Children's Library to include the addition of new furniture, mobile shelving, equipment and sensory-friendly educational tools, plus the replacement of carpeting and tile. These monies will be utilized to repair and replace broken windows and install a heat and moisture control system in the area with matching historic panes and the protection of outdoor storm window units that will further enhance the attractiveness of the children's area and protect it for years to come.

Tax-Wise Tips For Year-End Giving

Year-end planning is a ritual for many of our friends who like to coordinate their tax and gift planning. However, it may take on additional significance as we adjust to the changing tax laws and marketplace. Individuals who want to make a difference for future generations should consider how they could increase the impact of their giving. Here are a few tax-wise tips that may be helpful for your year-end gift planning.

Gifts by Check or Credit Card. When you write a check to charity, the gift is complete when the check is mailed. Mail it by December 31, and you can deduct it for the year 2022 even if the charity does not cash it until 2023. When you charge your gift to a bank credit card, it is deductible by the donor in the year the charge is made.

Gifts of Stock. If your financial services provider holds the securities (including mutual funds) for your account, instruct that they be transferred electronically. We will provide you and/or your provider all the information needed. This is the most convenient way to make a gift. If you hold the stock certificate, give us a call and we can walk you through the transfer/donation process.

Gifts of Appreciated Property. Gifts of appreciated property that would result in long-term capital gain if sold generally produce even greater benefits for you than gifts made in cash, by check, or by credit card. The reason? You can generally deduct the full value of the contributed property (subject to the 30% of AGI limitation), even the gain portion that has never been taxed. Gift assets to consider include not only stocks, but bonds, mutual funds, real estate, and other appreciated property.

IRA Rollover Gifts. Legislation allows people age 70½ or older to withdraw up to \$100,000 annually from their individual retirement accounts tax-free if they give money directly to charity. Previously, withdrawals from individual retirement accounts were subject to income tax and early withdrawal penalties.

Year-end is indeed a special time to give. Through creative gift planning, you may very well be able to do more for yourself and for the causes that are important to you.

How to Include the Attica, Covington, or Southeast Fountain Community Foundation in Your Will

How you include a charity in your will depends on what sort of gift you would like to make, and how you want to provide for your other beneficiaries. Take a look at the examples below.

1) Make a specific bequest

This bequest is an exact description of a dollar amount or specific asset from your estate to go to a beneficiary. It is very important that specific bequests be exact – vagueness can lead to confusion. Keep in mind that specific bequests are usually the first to be paid out.

When Christine made her will, she left her collection of fine art to her niece and \$50,000 to the Community Foundation.

(2) Make a percentage bequest

This bequest designates a fraction of the available estate to a beneficiary. Many prefer this kind of bequest because the relative size of the bequest is tied to the value of the estate, and that treats all heirs equally.

When Aaron made his will, he left 25% of his estate to each of his twin sons (50%), 25% to his local city park, and 12.5% each to his church and the Community Foundation.

(3) Make a residual bequest

This bequest assigns all the property that remains after the payment of administration costs, taxes and expenses, and every other bequest has been satisfied. A simple way to describe the residue of an estate is that which is "left over." After you have made provisions for individuals with exact amounts, you can give whatever is left of your estate to a worthy charity such as the Community Foundation. This option assures that your heirs are taken care of first.

When Mike made his will, he left \$150,000 to each of his four children (\$600,000), \$50,000 to a good friend Tiffany, and whatever was left of his estate to the Community Foundation.

(4) Make a contingent bequest

This bequest puts in place a "back-up" beneficiary – an individual or organization who will receive the gift only under certain circumstances. This option assures that unintended persons do not receive a gift originally meant for someone else.

When Dorothy made her will, she left her entire estate to her husband, Paul. In the event he precedes her death, her estate will be divided between the Community Foundation and two other worthwhile charities.
