DATES TO REMEMBER

2020

JUNE 15 – Scholarship recipients can begin requesting payment through the portal on our website.

JULY 1 - The online application process for the Lilly Endowment Community Scholarship begins. For details go to: www.wicf-inc.org.

AUGUST 21 - Deadline to complete the online Lilly Endowment Community Scholarship application.

SEPTEMBER 1 - Deadline for verification of school information for fall semester scholarship payments. Students must contact the Foundation office if this deadline cannot be met.

NOVEMBER 15 - National Philanthropy Day[®] is both an official day and a grassroots movement. Every year, since 1986 when President Ronald Reagan first proclaimed November 15th as National Philanthropy Day[®], communities across the globe have celebrated by hosting events to recognize activities of donors, volunteers, foundations, leaders, corporations, and others engaged in philanthropy ("the love of humankind").

DECEMBER 1 - Giving Tuesday, often stylized as #GivingTuesday for purposes of hashtag activism, refers to the Tuesday after U.S. Thanksgiving in the United States. It is a movement to create a national day of giving at the beginning of the Christmas and holiday season. Giving Tuesday was started in 2012 as a response to commercialization and consumerism in the post-Thanksgiving season (Black Friday and Cyber Monday).

DECEMBER 31 - Last day for scholarship recipients to request their second payment (if applicable).

DECEMBER 31 - Last day to make year-end gifts for 2020 tax purposes. Start planning NOW!

FROM THE CEO'S DESK

Dear Friend,

Much has changed in our lives the past few months. Self-isolation and social distancing have become new vocabulary words for all of us. Yet, life does, and must go on.

Your Community Foundation is prepared for times like this. Our spending rate for 2020 has already been determined and remains at 5%. Grant and

scholarship distributions will remain unchanged, even though fund values are temporarily less. We continue to pay invoices weekly and process charitable contributions daily.

The Board of Directors and staff at the Community Foundation have spent years being wise stewards of the donations that we have received and as a result we do not anticipate the need to adjust day-to-day operational spending. Even though our operating revenue will decline because of fund market values decline, we can operate at full capacity for the conceivable future.

For safety purposes our office is closed to the public, but we are able to meet with individuals by appointment. Our staff are utilizing a combination of working remotely and staggered work shifts to minimize social contact. Even though the office building is closed, we are open for business. 

GRANT GUIDELINES

GRANT FOCUS

Vermillion County Community Foundation focuses on local needs within the geographical boundaries of Vermillion County with consideration given to the areas of health, charitable service, education, cultural affairs, and community improvement.

All endowment funds, which stipulate in the fund agreement the areas to be supported from the income earned on the fund assets, will be honored regardless of location of the grant recipient.

GRANT REVIEW

The Board of Directors will review each grant request in preparation for its regular board meeting. Grant applications may be submitted at any time throughout the year. Applicants will be notified immediately following the Board of Directors' decision.

The Vermillion County Community Foundation is especially interested in learning of plans for:

- Start-up costs for new programs
- One-time projects or needs
- Capital needs beyond an applicant's capabilities

The Vermillion County Community Foundation will not consider:

- Individuals, except for scholarships
- · Organizations for political or religious purposes
- Support for regular operating budgets
- Contributions to endowments
- Long-term funding
- Post-event situations
- Apparel such as school/sport uniforms

With a long-term horizon, the Foundation investment philosophy prioritizes the preservation of the original donor gift. Donationsare invested (with the exception of pass-through funds) in order to create an annual stream of income which is distributed to thecharitable organizations, scholarship recipients or the purpose as designated by the donor.

A large number of endowed funds that donors created with the Foundation are given as unrestricted grants, which means the Foundation has discretion to grant those annual earnings to meet the community needs in the areas designated by the donor.

CHARITABLE GIFT ANNUITIES

A charitable gift annuity is an agreement between you and Vermillion County Community Foundation. In exchange for your charitable gift, the Foundation agrees to pay you and/or your loved ones a fixed annuity for life. The size of the payment is determined at the time the gift is made and will not fluctuate with the market. The Foundation issues gift annuities in amounts of \$10,000 and greater.

When you establish a gift annuity, you get to decide what endowment fund (scholarships, parks, senior citizens, children & youth, healthcare, historic preservation, etc.) at VCCF the annuity assets will ultimately support. You receive an immediate income tax deduction for a portion of the gift, and this deduction can be used over as many as six consecutive tax years. If your gift is funded with appreciated assets, you can also reduce your capital gains liability.

Charitable gift annuities are not insured by any government agency but are backed by the unrestricted assets of the Community Foundation.

Below are some sample rates and examples.

A) EXAMPLE OF A TWO-LIFE GIFT ANNUITY

Mr. and Mrs. Jones, both age 70, donate \$50,000 in cash to VCCF to fund a gift annuity. For the duration of both of their lives, the annuity will provide them with fixed annual payments of \$2,300. Over \$1,900 of this will be treated as tax-free income for the next 25 years, with the rest treated as ordinary income. The Jones' current income tax deduction will be over \$11,000, and the Jones have up to six years to use this deduction.

B) EXAMPLE OF A ONE-LIFE GIFT ANNUITY

Mrs. Smith, age 80, donates \$25,000 in appreciated stock with a cost basis of \$5,000 to VCCF to fund a gift annuity. For the duration of her lifetime, the annuity will provide her with fixed annual payments of \$1,725. The gift will partially bypass \$20,000 in gain and will save Mrs. Smith over \$1,300. Mrs. Smith's current income tax deduction will be over \$11,000 and may save her over \$1,700.

NEW FUNDS

The endowment funds listed below have recently been established by local organizations, businesses, and/ or caring citizens. Any individual, business, or organization can establish a fund and/or contribute to an existing fund at any time.

Donations made to these endowment funds are invested and a portion of the earnings is used to award grants to community organizations and/or to award scholarships to students for their post-high school education. Donations can be made in a variety of forms including gifts of cash, stock, real estate, life insurance, and charitable bequests.

Endowment funds can be established in honor or memory of loved ones for as little as \$1,000. Payouts from endowment funds begin when the fund has reached \$10,000 and has been invested for one full calendar year.

WILLIAM, JOHANNA AND MARK WILSON CHARITABLE COMMUNITY FUND

The Vermillion County Community Foundation is pleased to announce the establishment of the William, Johanna and Mark Wilson Charitable Community Fund at the Community Foundation.

According to Mark Wilson, the son of the late William and Johanna Wilson, "My parents were strong supporters of a variety of organizations and activities in the Vermillion County area and they instilled these values in me. That's the reason I am so involved in organizations like the Community Foundation, Riley's Children's Hospital, Optimist International and others. It's a pleasure for me to give back to Vermillion County in memory of my parents.

"My mother was from Antwerp, Belgium, and my dad was from Prairie Creek, Indiana. I was their only child. My dad owned the Clinton Frozen Food Locker for a number of years and then he went on to work for the Marathon Oil Bulk Plant. My mother had an entrepreneurial spirit and in 1971, they became owners of the Signal Hill (Hilltop) Truck Stop in Hillsdale. Later, in 1978 our family opened the Green Acres Restaurant south of Cayuga on Route 63 which operated for 38 years until my retirement in 2016.

"I had the pleasure of being raised in Clinton and attended Clinton area schools for my first eleven years; then I was a graduate of the first class from North Vermillion High School. I attended Indiana State University and Danville Area Community College. I majored in accounting and minored in business and economics."

All donations to the William, Johanna and Mark Wilson Charitable Community Fund are invested and a portion of the earnings each year will be utilized to assist in supporting innovative and creative problemsolving projects that have the potential to make significant long-term impact in Vermillion County. The projects may be in a wide variety of areas, including, but not limited to: education, health & wellness, economic improvement, community leadership development, park & recreation ventures, child & youth activities, senior citizen endeavors, school-based initiatives, visitors & tourism promotion, and others.

Dale White, CEO of the Community Foundation, states, "Every donated dollar makes a huge difference and stays right here in Vermillion County. Because of Mark's generosity, this will allow the Community Foundation to award an additional \$30,000 to \$37,500 this year, and even more into the future, as the Charitable Fund continues to grow, which is vital to our efforts to strengthen Vermillion County and fund opportunities which benefit our citizens."
